Dear Friends,

Jesus has risen! Risen indeed! Alleluia!

So now what? We've praised God for this, the ultimate miracle of our faith. We've sung and shouted our jubilant alleluias, colored eggs, and shared love, laughter, and Easter ham or lamb around the dinner table. Are we now just "back to our regularly scheduled program?"

Not exactly. According to farmer-poet Wendell Berry, Christianity is not a "one and done" faith, but one that calls us to follow Jesus' lead and *practice* resurrection throughout our lives. How does one practice rising from the dead while still alive? Berry's poem offers us some clues. Based on its words and images, *the art of surprise* seems to be a big part of it; that is, not necessarily doing what the world expects of us or considers to be successful per se. Jesus was poor, humble, countercultural, after all. Not only that, but he loved and cared for precisely the people his society rejected and tried to coerce him into rejecting. *Becoming comfortable with contradiction and paradox* also seems to be part of what Berry is pointing to: placing allegiance to God above earthly leaders and governments, even as we fully embrace the ideals for which our democracy stands; having faith in that which we cannot see or comprehend—in mystery and the mysterious; asking questions for which there may be no real answers so long as we are here on this earth. Speaking of which, another aspect of resurrection practice I believe Berry is recommending to us is *investing in eternity*: sowing seeds whose benefit we won't live long enough to fully reap, accepting life's messes and mortalities because our faith tells us that God will ultimately redeem them for good, and wastefully spreading the joy of this good news, even and especially as we approach life's end.

These are tall, deep orders, I know, and goals that could take more than a lifetime to complete. But, as Christians, we believe in redemption and eternal life. We've got the time! And, besides, it is well within our power to break down the overwhelming into manageable pieces. How? By rising each morning and asking ourselves, "How am I going to practice resurrection today?" and setting our sights on the little things, like smiling at someone who seems to be having a bad day. Or on bigger, but no less concrete things, like forgiving someone who has wronged us, or being kind to someone who rubs us the wrong way. Or on finding and lifting up the one good thing that happened on a bad day, in a troubled life, in a chaotic world. This we can do. And, over time, each of those seemingly little gestures will add up to something substantial. And give us that many more ways to share the good news of God's unconditional love and presence with those around us. Which is, in fact, the ultimate purpose of being the church.

In these 50 days we now travel between Easter and Pentecost, let us challenge one another and ourselves to commit to practicing resurrection on a daily basis. Imagine where this could take us and our community! With fertilizer such as this, imagine how rich a soil of faith we could cultivate and leave behind for the benefit of the spiritual descendants we will never know! Imagine all that we could accomplish simply by practicing resurrection...




The Rev. Dr. William Imes will offer us a historical perspective,

Rev. Dr. Bill Imes brings a rich understanding, as he not only has 36 years in pastoral ministry, but also served for 7 years as President of the Bangor Theological Seminary in Maine. His warm and engaging manner as speaker and facilitator are sure to be enjoyed by all.

A graduate of UNC-Chapel Hill, Yale Divinity School, and Eden Theological Seminary, Bill served two parishes in Iowa for 16 years and the First Parish Church, UCC of Brunswick, ME for 16 years. From 2001-2008 he was the President of Bangor Theological Seminary. Following retirement to Easthampton, MA, he has served as interim or sabbatical pastor for churches in Dalton, Northampton, South Hadley, Amherst, and Chicopee. Bill brings a deep interest in the life of parish churches to our topic today. His perspective has been shaped by his experiences as a pastor, a student, and a teacher of pastors and lay leaders. He has spoken or preached in over 200 congregations around the country, in Germany and Holland. He looks forward to being with us on April 10.

The popular Patheos blogger wants to restore the cross as primarily a symbol of God’s overwhelming love for us and to rescue Christians from the shame and guilt of seeing our situation as “sinners in the hands of an angry God.”

Many Christians believe that God demanded his only Son die a cruel, gruesome death to appease His wrath, since humanity is so irredeemably sinful and therefore repugnant to God. Tony Jones, a popular Christian blogger, author, and scholar, argues that this understanding is actually a medieval invention and not what the Bible really teaches. He looks beyond medieval convictions and liberates how we see Jesus’ death on the cross from this restrictive paradigm. Christians today must transcend the shame and guilt that have shaped conceptions of the human soul and made us fearful of God, and replace them with love, grace, and joyfulness; which better express what the cross is really about.

How we understand the cross reflects directly upon the kind of God we worship. By letting go of a wrathful God who cannot stand to be in our presence unless he pretends to see Jesus in our place, we discover the biblical God who reaches out to love and embrace us while “we were yet sinners.” Jones offers a positive, loving, inclusive interpretation of the faith that is both challenging and inspiring. Essential reading for modern Christians.

Summary of February Meeting

Income Opportunities

- * Amy has dropped off the Uno's fund raiser application and is meeting with someone to finalize the date. The Council agreed April 10 was a good date, although this date is now under review due to a prior congregational commitment.
- * Jeri has set the flea market date as April 30. Pastor Dennis is going to provide appraisals for silver and is recruiting someone else to do general antique appraisals.
- * Fran has communicated Council's approval of renting Fellowship Hall to Carol Dearborn for additional yoga classes, but has not heard back from Carol about her decision.
- * Jim M reported that he has reached out to the cell phone tower contact who said he would drive by the building and get back to Jim. Jim is still waiting for a response. Jim also contacted the B&G person from Shrewsbury Congregational.

Hearing Assistance Loop

- * Fran provided the written materials that Jenn had researched about this system. Jim F agreed to review the material and discuss it with the Council in a future meeting.

Safe Church

- * The Council discussed the progress toward Safe Church over the last 10 years. They agreed to continue this conversation and decide whether to move forward in 2016.

Pastor Update

- * Pastor Carol reported that the first session of this year's Death and Dying seminar at Brierly Pond had 18 participants and more participants are expected next week.
- * Carol asked if Council members would be ready to review the first 2 chapters of *Creating a Healthier Church: Family Systems Theory, Leadership and Congregational Life* in March. Council will read the book together with chapters assigned to individuals to present each month after Pastor Carol presents the first 2 chapters. The Council agreed.
- * Pastor Carol also noted that she believed it was the right time to begin discussing the Pastoral Relations Committee again. Rev Charlotte has suggested that perhaps we would want to engage some of the parents of young children on that committee since it would only meet quarterly. One of the parents present expressed skepticism as to whether many of the young parents would be willing to serve in this capacity.
- * Pastor Carol will be taking vacation 3/28 to 4/5. Jeri will be preaching that Sunday with a church historical presentation.

Building & Grounds

- * **Air Filtration System** – Kathy has paid off the loan for the air filtration system. Payments for the \$4,400 loan over 24 months will now go directly to her. Cheryl will create a document for Kathy regarding the church's obligation to pay that debt back to her.
- * **Parsonage Heating** - Carol reported that the plumber and Triangle Tube sales rep have not returned her calls regarding the warranty payment of our repair bill. Jim is going to try to follow up with the plumber, Greg Gauthier. Fran will resend information for Alain via Jim F. concerning contacting the installing plumber Chris Comeau to seek restitution.
- * **Elevator & Gas Inspections** - Jim M. reported is managing the Elevator Inspection and Gas meter inspection. Jenn will provide information regarding the elevator inspector.

- * **Rental Management** - Pastor Carol, Jim M, and Jenn scheduled a meeting to hand off building rental responsibilities to Jim M.

Financial/Stewardship update/Blackrock update

- * Chris reported no change in Stewardship totals provided in the Annual Report.
- * Cheryl has access to all of the financial systems and banking websites and will document a reimbursement policy to clarify expectations for members. She will work with Carol to ensure the TV cable bill reimbursements have been received and recorded for 2015.
- * Blackrock transfer update – Chris now has access to the account. He noted that the fees are reasonable and there is not a pressing reason to move it to Fidelity at this time. The Council noted that the newly formed Investment Team should meet a couple of times in 2016 to discuss the overall investment strategy and accounts. Chris suggested that, based on the church’s current financial position, we may want to consider pulling out of the stock market altogether.

Annual Meeting

- * Summer Worship times – Carol is planning to take the pulse from the membership as to whether we should continue to change our summer worship time to 9:30am.
- * Piano fundraising – We will vote to formally approve the purchase of the piano Joyce has found for \$10,000. Council agreed that Carol should send an email out prior to the meeting describing the new piano and asking for the final \$1,200 needed to purchase it.

Congregational Coaching sessions

- * Pastor Carol reported that Rev Charlotte Wright would like to have her next coaching session with Council members. The Council discussed and agreed to review the topic of Leadership Development and to begin a Behavioral Covenant with her. The date of Saturday, March 19 at 10 am was decided for this session.
